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About Us

Our Structure

All ten Caritas organisations share their ecclesial responsibility for social and charitable work in Austria and with respect to international aid. They are united in solidarity and closely cooperate in a variety of ways to achieve greater impact. Caritas Austria in its role as federal organisation serves as a coordinator and service provider assuming nationwide tasks while also working to reconcile the interests of all diocesan Caritas organisations.

As laid down in the statutes, the Caritas Austria General Assembly is the supreme decision-making body of the Caritas Austria institute, without prejudice to the legal independence of the diocesan Caritas organisations, and is responsible for the strategic cooperation framework of Caritas in Austria. Among other issues, it sets strategic priorities with nationwide relevance, decides on fundamental strategic goals and on the number and topics of the cross-diocesan management teams. The Assembly elects the Caritas President and the other four members of the Presidium. The General Assembly also appoints the General Secretaries of Caritas Austria.



Editorial



People in Need

Poverty on the Rise. Nursing Needs Our Care. Caritas Steps In.

Austria. The worldwide crises and their effects were strongly evident in 2023. Poverty is on the rise, leaving many people unable to afford housing and electricity. The shortage of nursing staff raises further concerns: How will we care for our relatives in need of support in the future? Caritas steps in with immediate help and strives for a better future.

The past years of crisis have plunged numerous people into existential hardship. In 2023, the situation worsened for those living in poverty. The staggering rise in fixed costs for housing, energy, and food is overwhelming many budgets. When unexpected expenses arise, making ends meet becomes nearly impossible. Mrs. S. faced a similar situation. Living alone on a minimum pension, she has only 305 euros a month left after covering fixed costs. Caritas stepped in when a gas leak in her apartment resulted in a hefty bill she could not afford. At our social counseling center, we assisted Mrs. S. with support applications and provided food vouchers to ease her burden. Given the heightened vulnerability of groups such as individuals on minimum pensions, single parents, families with multiple children, or persons with disabilities to falling into poverty, our organization has partnered with the Ministry of Social Affairs' "Wohnschirm-Energie" support initiative. Through this collaboration, we have been able to offer guidance and financial assistance to many low-income people confronting energy arrears. We are also assisting people at risk of poverty through the nationwide project "Saving Energy at Home: Advice and Appliance Swap," supported by the Ministry for Climate Action. We team up with them to craft energy-saving strategies

to cut down on their expenses. Furthermore, we offer to swap out inefficient large electrical appliances, which result in high bills, for energy-efficient models. Extending immediate and prompt assistance to those in need is absolutely essential. Nonetheless, it is clear that these interventions alone will not provide a permanent escape from the cycle of poverty. For that reason, we are pressing for a comprehensive restructuring of the social welfare system, urging policymakers to take action.

One straightforward and impactful solution would be to raise the equalization supplement reference rate, which determines benefits such as the minimum pension or social assistance. Currently (2024) set at EUR 1,217.96, the rate falls significantly below the poverty threshold of EUR 1,572. Bringing it up to match the threshold would lift many people out of poverty, particularly women and children.

Nursing Needs Our Care Now

As one of Austria's leading organizations in nursing and caregiving, we take care of elderly and ill people across our numerous facilities. Alongside inpatient and mobile care, we provide assisted living, meals on wheels, home assistance, and visiting services. We also support family caregivers because they

perform admirably every day. Likewise, our nursing and caregiving staff ensure people live dignified lives, despite the challenging conditions they sometimes face. However, prolonged stagnation and demographic trends are making these efforts increasingly difficult. An urgent systemic reform is needed to ensure compassionate, high-quality nursing care persists in the future.

Our main focus is always on people: those who need care and those who deliver it. With a projected shortage of up to 3,000 nursing and caregiving staff by 2030, investing in training is crucial. This involves granting subsidies, increasing the number of instructors, and offering sufficient practical guidance. We also need to adjust the system to enable caregivers to perform well, feel content when they leave work, and look forward to returning. Balancing work and personal life is essential. Additionally, we have to simplify the process for foreign skilled workers to enter the Austrian job market.

Furthermore, shifting our focus to prevention rather than aftercare is a necessity.

Ensuring long-term health should be our primary concern. The ongoing improvements to the care allowance system, which prioritize resource utilization, will contribute to this goal.

Our caregivers dedicate themselves wholeheartedly to those in need of support.

Interview with Anna Parr

“Only Together Can We Overcome All of This.”

The situation for people living in poverty in Austria has worsened in 2023. What is needed to sustainably address this issue?

Anna Parr: Despite Austria's fundamentally strong welfare state, poverty remains a reality. Those most affected are: women and children, single parents, people on minimum pensions, and the unemployed. To ensure people regain effective and sustainable protection against poverty, we need a reform of the welfare state. This primarily entails elevating the key reference rate of our welfare system, the equalization supplement, to match the poverty threshold. Additionally, reforms

to unemployment benefits and social assistance are necessary to establish a genuine basic provision.

How does Caritas help those who can no longer cover their costs?

Our 71 social counseling centers serve as the first point of contact, relieving people of immediate burdens while striving to sustainably improve their long-term living conditions. In addition, we offer people in need access to affordable food items and meals at over 100 locations, provide overnight shelters for the homeless, and accommodation in mother and child shelters. In our family counseling centers and Lerncafés, we support children and their families.

We also give a voice to those often unheard and are dedicated to the sustainable eradication of poverty.

People with migrant or refugee backgrounds often find themselves in difficult situations in Austria. What is needed for their successful integration?

We require integration services right from day one, with a primary focus on providing nationwide access to German courses and early assessment of qualifications and experience for job market prospects. Achieving fast integration here creates a win-win situation, notably in addressing the skilled labor shortage.

This also concerns around 70,000 displaced persons from Ukraine who are

forced to remain inactive in basic welfare provision. We urge that these individuals, predominantly women and children, be granted long-term residency – providing the foundation for a self-determined life here.

The shortage of skilled workers also hits the nursing sector hard. What are the biggest challenges in this field?

Even though more people are working in care and nursing today than ever before, the demand continues to rise due to demographic trends. Despite our focus on nursing training, we are currently short by approximately 3,000 graduates each year. The federal government has implemented several effective measures, particularly in the field of vocational training, which are already showing results. However, there is still a need for more: more apprenticeship opportunities, their sustainable financing, improved working conditions, and a targeted strategy for recruiting nursing professionals from abroad – ensuring quality and fairness.

What else must be done to secure access to nursing care for all who need it, now and in the future?

A reform of the overall system is needed because care and nursing are currently a patchwork: Working conditions, services, and costs vary depending on the federal state, and nationwide coverage is not guaranteed.

The reform must tackle this patchwork system by establishing an effective workforce package and uniform staffing ratios. At the same time, we need to secure long-term funding for care and nursing, while also focusing on the potential of digitalization and preventive healthcare.

What challenges do people with disabilities face in Austria and how does Caritas help?

We support people with disabilities at home, in daycare centers, or in our residential facilities. Our aim is always to help them live as independently as they can. However, this is not always assured:

According to the UN, Austria still has gaps in implementing the human rights of people with disabilities.

In this context, we need nationwide inclusive education and a swift expansion of personal assistance, which is crucial for inclusion and self-determination. Additionally, integration into the labor market is necessary, given that the lack of social insurance intensifies the risk of poverty.

Austria is about to hold elections. Where does Caritas see the most urgent need for action for the next federal government?

We are facing a time of multiple crises – war in Europe, social upheaval, societal polarization, a worsening economic outlook, and the impact of the climate crisis.

Only together can we overcome all of this. It is essential for society to reunite, engage in dialogue, and collaborate in shaping our future, echoing Caritas' guiding principle: 'We see need and act.' This requires the involvement of the whole society and serves as an appeal to politicians as well.

Children and Young People

Being a Child Despite War

Children in Need. Millions of children worldwide suffer from armed conflicts. Experiences such as displacement and loss cause trauma, fear, and stress. According to the WHO, over 1.5 million children in Ukraine need psychological care. In many places, we provide support and create spaces where they can simply be children.

The war in Ukraine has been raging for over two years, affecting every child in the country in one way or another. Many have experienced traumatic events. Daily bomb alerts trigger moments of fear or retraumatization.

Striving to create safe environments for children, Caritas has established bomb shelters in 18 schools in western Ukraine and equipped a designated room in each as a safe space. This setup allows lessons to continue, even in the event of imminent air strikes, ensuring valuable stability in daily life. In these safe spaces, children can play and be creative after school: they can simply be children. In addition, 36 social workers help the children with age-appropriate measures to adapt to the new living conditions, foster positive thinking, and improve their responses to stressful situations.

All our staff members engage in continuous and systematic professional development, learning from each other, as do the teachers. Parents are also provided with guidance and included in these processes, fostering a strong partnership among school, counselors, and families, thus establishing a safety net for the children.

We also care for the children during their school vacations. They can relax, meet friends, engage in sports, or participate in excursions. After all, a family vacation is not possible for most of them. Additionally, special programs assist teenagers in dealing with the challenges of puberty.

Moreover, children and adolescents receive tailored psychosocial assistance. Therapists offer them the opportunity to discuss and cope with potentially traumatic events. Our safe spaces, in essence, furnish a secure environment where children can freely express their emotions whenever needed.

A further 260 children and young people receive support at the social center in Kiev, which we sponsor. Among them are the brothers Denis (4) and Daniil (3), who are growing up here. Their father passed away, and their mother abandoned them. The children cried often and relied only on each other. The explosions further frightened them. Despite these challenges, the dedicated staff on site ensure that Denis and Daniil experience a happy and healthy upbringing. "Thanks to Caritas' support, we are confident that our efforts will succeed," says Vera Koshil, director of the center and orphanage.

Oasis Of Normalcy

The Kharkiv region in northeastern Ukraine is experiencing intense fighting, with a constant threat of rocket attacks making daily life extremely difficult. In this volatile conflict environment, the creativity center for children and families, supported by Caritas, serves as a crucial anchor of stability. Despite – or perhaps because of – the critical situation, the center's staff work tirelessly to maintain operations. For many residents, the center represents an oasis of normal life amidst the brutal turmoil of war, offering a safe space

where both children and parents can engage in a variety of activities, including drawing, dancing, circus acrobatics, and aircraft modeling. These programs not only nurture creativity but also foster a sense of community and solidarity among participants, helping alleviate stress and allowing them to forget about the ongoing war, at least for a while.

Our Support for Refugee Children in Austria

In Austria, we provide assistance to displaced children from Ukraine in several of our 69 Lerncafés, where free learning support is offered. One such center is the

Begegnungszentrum Linz (Linz Meeting Center), initiated by long-term residents of Upper Austria with Ukrainian backgrounds, specifically for Ukrainians. This collaborative effort involves Caritas and the association "Ukrainische Community in OÖ – Point of Ukraine." Here, children

and young people can enjoy their leisure time without feeling like outsiders or encountering language barriers. They engage in activities such as dancing, singing, and crafting together, or they can join the youth club while also benefiting from academic support.

Climate Crisis, Wars, Disasters

Worldwide. Before the eyes of the world, a humanitarian crisis with imminent famine is unfolding in the Gaza Strip. Violent earthquakes have shaken Turkey and Syria, and the climate crisis continues to destroy livelihoods globally. Caritas supports people in emergencies worldwide, providing long-term assistance to help them become self-sufficient.

On October 7th, 2023, terrorists from Hamas and other extremist groups carried out a massacre in Israel, resulting in the deaths of over 1,200 people and the abduction of 250 hostages into the Gaza Strip. The country responded with a broad offensive. Since then, a humanitarian crisis has been unfolding in the Gaza Strip before the eyes of the world: Over 34,000 people lost their lives in the first six months. By April 2024, 1.7 million of the roughly 2.2 million residents have been displaced. Attacks are occurring in areas designated as safe, many buildings have been destroyed, and medical care has collapsed. There is no safe place in Gaza, and with nothing to eat or drink, an acute famine is looming.

We provide assistance.

There is no way out of the Gaza Strip and very limited access in, which is why humanitarian aid arrives slowly and far from the needed quantities. Despite these challenges, Caritas provides assistance: Through a special logistics center set up in Cairo, our local partners work with other aid organizations to procure relief supplies and transport them across the border.

By April 2024, we were able to supply 113,000 households with food packages, preventing people from starving. Over 11,000 families received mattresses or mats and blankets for sleeping, while more than 15,000 families were provided with tarpaulins or tents. Additionally, 1,500 people found temporary shelter in four church facilities we support. Our aid workers in Gaza also deliver emergency medical

care and psychological first aid to the numerous traumatized people. *(Note: This text was written in April 2024 and only covers events up to that date. Any developments thereafter were not accounted for.)*

Earthquakes: From Emergency Aid to Reconstruction

Another disaster struck in early February, when violent earthquakes shook south-eastern Turkey and northern Syria. Nearly 60,000 people lost their lives, and more than 125,000 were injured. Together with our regional partner organizations, we offered immediate emergency aid, distributing food, hygiene packages, and drinking water, as well as establishing emergency shelters and supplying mattresses and blankets. These efforts supported almost 12,100 individuals. Moreover, cash aid allowed 10,000 people to independently meet their basic needs and carry out essential repairs.

To this day, we continue to assist those affected in rebuilding their livelihoods, such as through reconstructing agricultural businesses and markets, and ensuring water and sanitation provision. We are also backing educational programs and delivering psychological assistance. Our aim is to help 15,500 people by the end of 2025.

Adapting to Climate Change

Disasters such as droughts, storms, and floods – consequences of the climate

crisis – are posing an increasingly severe threat to people worldwide. They devastate vital harvests and exacerbate global hunger on an ever-growing scale. This impact is particularly acute in the Global South, where the most impoverished communities reside. We are tirelessly engaged in projects aimed at helping people adapt to these evolving conditions. For instance, in Ethiopia, we support small-scale farmers in enhancing their farming techniques by introducing

more resilient seeds, promoting composting, and diversifying agriculture. In addition, we distribute energy-saving stoves to reduce CO₂ emissions and combat deforestation.

YourJob: As Work Is More Than a Paycheck

Western Balkans. Whether you need help finding an internship, writing your CV, or getting seed capital to start your own business: YourJob has already benefited over 10,000 young people in the Western Balkans.

Luca repairs roofs, Marko distills fine spirits himself, Livia helps four-legged friends look well-groomed, and Ana sells roses, tulips, and lilies grown on her parents' farm to the flower trade. All of them have found their jobs thanks to YourJob, the Caritas employment program. Work in their own country. Work they can live on.

Albania, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Kosovo, Montenegro, North Macedonia, or Serbia: In the Western Balkan countries that participate in the YourJob program, emigration is high. Young people in particular leave their home countries

because many of them earn little more than 300 euros a month. They take with them their knowledge, expertise, and all they have learned. What remains behind are structurally weak areas where mainly the elderly and children live.

"Apart from counseling apprentices and university graduates, I am frequently in contact with companies," says Marija, a social worker for YourJob in Mostar, Bosnia. She feels great pride when young people who face significant challenges in life find work through her mediation efforts. Almost ten percent of the YourJob beneficiaries belong to the Roma mi-

nority. Moreover, 265 young adults with special needs have completed a training program. Another focus is on empowering women.

The program, which was launched in 2019, entered its second phase at the end of 2022. While financial support is fundamental, the program offers much more: "YourJob can change lives," states Marija. She recalls a young Bosnian man who once timidly stepped into the Caritas office. Since then, he has established a company – and a family – the social worker notes with satisfaction.

Combining work with creativity, Marsida fulfills her long-cherished dream thanks to YourJob.



5,4 million Euros in funding received from the European Union (EU) for our projects in Syria, Ukraine, India, Lebanon, Uganda, Moldova, DR Congo, and internationally.

8 million Euros in funding received from the Austrian Development Agency (ADA) for our projects in Moldova, Jordan, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, DR Congo, Mozambique, Lebanon, South Sudan, Armenia, Kenya, as well as for general initiatives across Africa and Europe.

The funding we have secured from the EU and ADA will be implemented in 2023 and subsequent years.

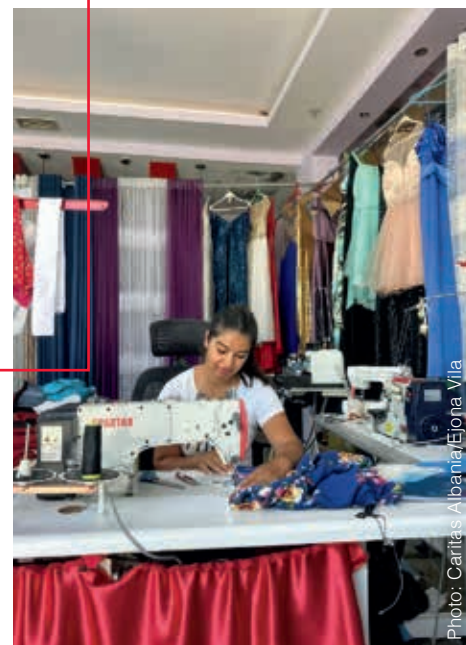

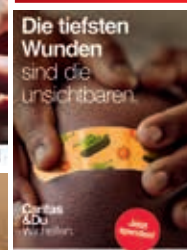

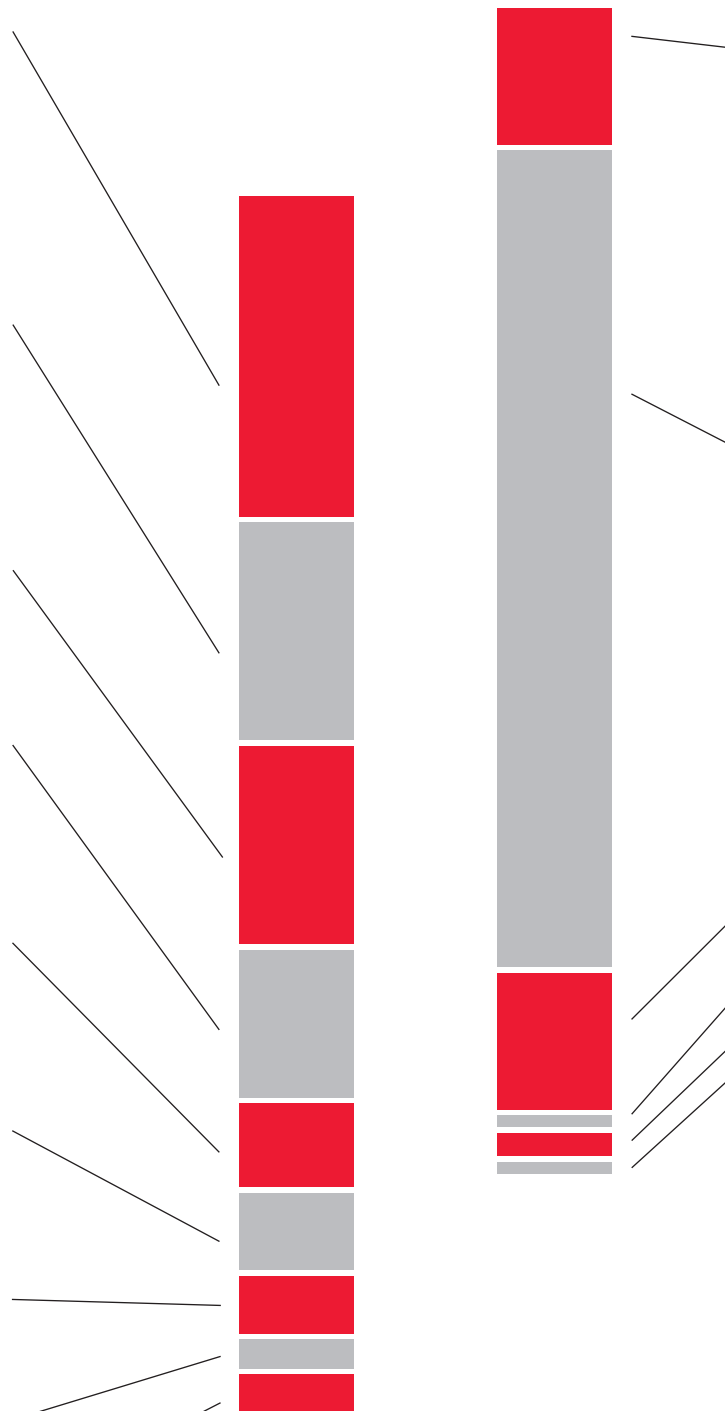
